


The Gift of Awe

I recently read a New York Times article about awe. In this article written by Hope Reese, she quoted several experts on the topic of awe. One of those experts, Dr. Dacher Keltner, contends that awe is felt in the presence of something that "transcends your understanding of the world." Awe occurs when we witness acts of kindness by others. I can wholeheartedly understand those points. Indeed, as I write this article, I am utterly filled with awe from the kindness of our fellow neighbors (and others) as they came together to fund an important and worthy project. Last month, Board President Josh Hanselman wrote about the Beach Task Force's drive to develop a beach access in Bayshore that was accessible for individuals with mobility challenges.

As you may recall, Bayshore received a grant from the Oregon Coast Visitors' Association (OCVA) to buy Mobi-Mats so that those individuals who are challenged to walk on sand could walk on those sturdy mats out to the beach. However, there was a hitch. OCVA stated that to receive those funds, Bayshore needed to have a parking lot across from the access that would accommodate at least one vehicle used by someone with mobility challenges. The cost to construct the parking lot was steep. No grants could be found to pay for the construction. So, the Beach Access Task Force, with Board approval, initiated a fundraiser with the hope of obtaining the funds to develop the lot. I'm incredibly pleased to write that in only a few short weeks, the goal of the fundraiser was reached. Bayshore now has the funds to construct the parking lot.

Our goal was achieved because of the generosity of 24 members/couples and two non-members (please see the list of those individuals at the end of this article; a few asked to be partially or completely anonymous). Several donors gave because of their needs, family needs, or in memory of family members who would have appreciated the pathway.

OCVA is aware of our success and is prepared to provide Bayshore the funds for the Mobi-Mats. The last step to make this beach access a reality is to obtain the necessary County and State permits. The Task Force already is working on those applications.

In the New York Times article, Dr. Keltner is cited as saying that awe is "just around us." He has stated that one of the most trustworthy ways for us to experience awe is through the "simple act of witnessing the goodness of others." Through this fundraiser, I have had a front row seat in witnessing others' goodness to our community and to those individuals who will finally be able to experience our beautiful beach firsthand. Thank you to all those individuals who made this goal a reality. I truly am filled with awe.

The Nature of Bayshore

Alvin & the Chipmunks Part Deux



Last month, we learned a little about a cute rodent, the Townsend's chipmunk. We learned about its unique physical characteristics, what it eats, where it lives, and a bit about its personality. Now, to finish, let's explore its mating habits, its young, and the role it plays in our ecosystem. Interestingly, but not unlike other chipmunks, the Townsend's chipmunk is not promiscuous, nor does it form a pair bond. Mating occurs seasonally once a year for about 2 weeks between late spring and early summer. This is the best time when food is readily available, and the climate is favorable. Like other chipmunks, it is viviparous with a gestation period of about 28-33 days. A female typically gives birth to 3-6 young from May to June in her burrow. The newborns weigh only about 0.12 ounces and have no hair or teeth. Their eyes are closed, ears folded, feet webbed, and skin translucent. After about 10 days, dorsal hairs begin to grow on their back, but their eyes are still closed. As you can imagine, they are not quite helpless but are able to use their forelimbs to move by pulling and pushing. By 20 days, they have fur, incisors, and are more active. Typically, these youngsters appear above ground in July, when food and climate conditions are favorable. At the end of the 50-day weaning period, they weigh around 1.23 ounces and at 90 days, they are considered adults. Adults reach sexual maturity at 353 days and can reproduce the following summer. So, with this kind of turn around, it looks like we won't have a shortage of these cute critters here in Bayshore.

Besides being fun to watch, the Townsend's chipmunk contributes to the well-being of our natural environment. It primarily is a consumer (though it does not feed exclusively on plants). Because of its low digestibility, the seeds it eats end up in its feces, enabling it to be primarily a seed dispenser. Moreover, it stores seeds in its burrow, and even if it consumes these during winter, some might remain at the beginning of the spring and germinate. Since the Townsend's chipmunk relies partially on a mycophagous (feeding on fungi) diet, it also may participate in fungi dispersal. It spreads the spores by carrying them on its feet, and by eating fungi, and by dispersing them in its feces. This dispersal enriches the soil, resulting in enhanced soil quality in the forest, which in turn might be an advantage in commercial forestry. To conclude our study of this cute rodent, we do need to talk about its name. Research indicates that it was named after John Kirk Townsend (1809-1851) who was an American naturalist, ornithologist, and collector. He was a Quaker born in Philadelphia and trained as a physician and pharmacist. Whatever your feelings are about rodents, one must admit that there is one literally outstanding quality chipmunks possess. Their cheeks, which when stuffed, can expand to 3 times larger than its head! Now, not too many rodents can do that!



BEACH ACCESS

Please only use designated public beach accesses marked with signs to get to the beach.

• QUIET TIME

The hours of 10pm to 7 am are required quiet time per Bayshore and Lincoln County ordinance.

• RV Parking

No RVs may be parked on Bayshore properties or along the roadside without previous permission of the planning committee & within limitations set forth.

• PARKING


Please park in the garage or driveway. The roads are narrow, and vision can be obstructed by vehicles along the road. SPEED LIMIT IS 25MPH.

• PETS

Per Bayshore C&R's and Oregon law you must keep your pets confined to your yard or on a leash. Also, you must clean up after them.

• SAFETY

The ocean can be very dangerous. Please watch your children very carefully. Seals and seal pups, snowy plovers and other marine animals are protected species. Keep at least 200 feet away and keep your pets from running up on them. Federal law prohibits touching, feeding or disturbing marine mammals.

FIRE

Fire is a very real danger. Fireworks are NOT allowed in Bayshore or on the beach and are a serious hazard during dry weather. OAR 736.021.0100 prohibits "possessing, discharging or causing to be discharged any firecracker, explosion, torpedoes, rockets, fireworks or other similar devices" on Oregon beaches. Beach fires are ONLY permitted on open sand west of the dunes and cannot be started in areas of built-up driftwood.

- **GARBAGE AND REFUSE DISPOSAL LOT UPKEEP** Lots must be kept clean and in visually pleasing condition. Keep weeds, cleared and trimmed trees within the C&R limits. Garbage and other waste shall be placed in sanitary containers with lids and removed weekly. Garbage cans stored near the street must be screened from the view.
- Be kínd to your neíghbors.
